



Mid-Atlantic Fishery Management Council Visioning Survey

The Mid-Atlantic Fishery Management Council is looking to its constituents to help shape the future of our fisheries. Our objective is to gather as much information as possible about what is most important to you. The Council will use your input to develop a shared vision for the future of our fisheries and a strategic plan to accomplish the vision.

In this survey, "fisheries" refers to the species that the Council manages, the environment those species live in, the fishermen, and other people in related industries.

The Mid-Atlantic Council is responsible for managing fisheries in federal waters (3-200 miles from shore) between New York and North Carolina. The survey focuses primarily on these fisheries.

In addition to this survey, there are visioning surveys for each of the Council's managed species. All participants may complete one of each of the surveys. You may access the online versions of these surveys on the Council website.
